Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)


The <u>Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP</u>), formerly known as food stamps, is a federal program that operates under the requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service to provide nutritional assistance benefits to eligible individuals and families. SNAP provides a monthly benefit to households through an <u>Electronic Benefits Card (EBT)</u> to supplement the purchase of nutritious foods. Eligibility for SNAP benefits is based on financial and nonfinancial criteria.

To determine eligibility and/or apply for SNAP benefits online, visit <u>CommonHelp</u>. Alternatively, paper applications are available and may be submitted manually to the applicant's <u>local department of social services</u>.
